I am writing to invite you to participate in an MIT seminar for senior Congressional staff on technology and policy options for addressing climate change. The seminar, "**Technology & Policy Paths to Net Zero**," will take place on the MIT campus in Cambridge, MA from April 20 – 22. To allow for robust discussion, invitations are being extended only to senior Congressional staff who work on a variety of energy-related policy areas.

We are able to pay for the cost of travel and hotel accommodations and are carefully following House and Senate Ethics Committee requirements. The necessary forms will be provided to you should you apply to attend.

As you will see in the attached agenda, the seminar will include sessions with a range of MIT faculty with expertise on potential technological and policy approaches to climate. The seminar will also include tours of The Engine, a technology incubator and venture fund spun off from MIT, and of our fusion energy laboratory.

On the morning of April 21, the seminar will include attendance at a broader MIT event at which the flagship research projects from our Climate Grand Challenges competition will describe their plans. That event will also include a panel discussion with outside experts on moving research breakthroughs from the lab to the marketplace.

The organizers of this seminar include Robert C. Armstrong, Director of the MIT Energy Initiative and Chevron Professor of Chemical Engineering; Robert Stoner, Deputy Director of the MIT Energy Initiative; and Professor Christopher Knittel from the MIT Sloan School of Management.

If you apply and are offered a place at the seminar, you will need to adhere to MIT's Covid in-person event policies. Attendees will have to attest that they have been vaccinated and

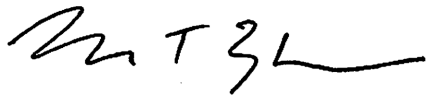
boosted, or that they have a religious or medical reason for exemption. As of now, masks will be required at this event.

Question 16: All are 'Good Faith Estimates' and I enclose a breakdown of the expenses listed.

Transportation Expenses: \$507.45 total, which represents an airfare of \$289.45 + \$68 booking fees (for changed flights when original outbound flight was cancelled by Jetblue) + approx. \$150 for ground/bus transportation to & from the airport and hotel and between the hotel and the Samberg Center and the Labs. Ms. Borja will also be reimbursed for cabs/Lyft/Uber fares to and from her home and DCA/Reagan airport up to a maximum of \$80.00.

Lodging: We have secured an excellent rate at the Residence Inn Boston Cambridge at a total cost of \$476 + tax for 2 nights. This is well below the per diem and includes breakfast.

Meal expenses: We estimate that the total for all meals will be \$255 which includes two formal meals. (see question 21, below, for more details). This represents \$85 on the first day; \$125 for the second day and \$45 for the last day (1/2 day).

Question 21: Food expenses for catered events on campus and in Cambridge, MA in general are somewhat higher than the per diem rate due to the high cost of food/catering in the general Boston area. Restaurant Associates are the sole provider of food at the MIT Samberg Center where we are holding our two formal events (the opening working lunch on April 20th and the dinner with speaker on April 21st). Their prices are generally a little less than local hotel restaurants but as with every caterer we have approached this year, food prices have increased due to both staff shortages and due to the extra precautions taken with food preparation due to Covid (eg. catering staff use of PPE, extra sanitation requirements, individually wrapped items where possible, etc). We feel confident that we have secured the cheapest available food options.
