Expense Change	Revised Amount	Explanation
Transportation	\$3,388.28	Flight costs changed due to the last-minute nature of booking, the difficulty and remoteness of the COP location, and the limited flight options available as a result. Taxi costs were low in Belem.
Meals	\$202.61	Adjusting to reflect reduced costs due to free in flight meals, breakfasts included at hotel, and low cost of food in Belem.
Lodging	\$18,060.00	SEEC Institute negotiated with the hotel to have single rather than double rooms, reducing costs. Travelers had rooms reserved from the night of the 13th and checked out on the 16th, totaling use of rooms for 3 nights. Per night cost per room was: \$1505.00. The property is a three-star budget hotel with a normal nightly rate of around \$60 per room. For the duration of the conference, rates across hotels in Belém were substantially inflated and imposed minimum booking periods of two weeks. This surge reflected the extreme demand for lodging created by tens of thousands of attendees traveling to a city with limited hotel capacity. As a result, travelers had no reasonably secure, lower-cost alternatives for these dates.

On behalf of SEEC Institute, it is my pleasure to extend a formal invitation to join the SEEC Institute delegation to COP 30. Held in Belém, Brazil -- the “gateway to the Amazon” -- ten years after the conclusion of the Paris Agreement in 2015, COP 30 will be a pivotal moment for the international climate movement.

While at COP, the delegation will work on a number of important issue areas and missions, including strengthening U.S. climate diplomacy, engaging on climate and trade policy, rallying the U.S. private sector, and promoting American commercial diplomacy.

The daily delegation schedule at COP 30 will focus on activities like these:

- Conduct bilateral meetings and policy exchanges with foreign officials;
- Interface with fellow parliamentarians and legislators from key partner countries;

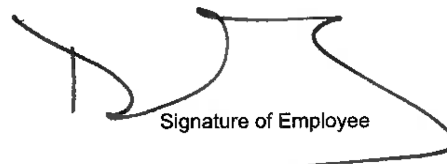

Cost Exceeds Per Diem Reason Accommodation challenges for COP30 have been unusually severe. Lodging in Belém is so scarce and overpriced that the UN, national delegations, and civil society participants have struggled to secure rooms, with some considering skipping the conference altogether. The Brazilian government's housing portal offered only apartments, cruise ship cabins, or unsafe and unsuitable hotels. Because Member safety is our top priority, we engaged a hotel broker used by trusted partners. The broker identified the most affordable viable option, the Grão Pará Hotel, which, despite being the cheapest, remains significantly inflated due to price gouging. The same hotel typically costs about \$59 per night under normal conditions, but rates have surged severalfold for COP30. Staying outside Belém would make meaningful participation impossible.
