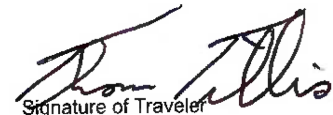

ICCF representatives will outline the purpose and agenda of the mission, give an overview of ICCF, and provide background on US government support for conservation, food security, and human development in Kenya, providing participants with baseline information they will need throughout the trip.

08:45 - 09:30 Transfer to Wilson Airport

10:00 - 11:30 Flight to Kakuma Airstrip on Kenya Air charter

11:30 - 13:30 Visit to Kakuma Refugee Camp

Kakuma Refugee Camp is located in the Northwestern region of Kenya. The camp was established in 1992 following the arrival of the "Lost Boys of Sudan". During that year, large groups of Ethiopian refugees fled their country following the fall of the Ethiopian government. Somalia had also experienced high insecurity and civil strife causing people to flee.

The delegation will be visiting a hospital in Kakuma that will show first hand the impact of conflict and changing weather impacts on food security.



13:30 - 15:00 Flight from Kakuma Refugee Camp back to Nairobi on Kenya Air charter

15:00 - 16:00 Transfer to US Embassy

16:00 - 17:00 Meeting with US Chargé d'Affaires Marc Dillard and classified country briefing

The delegation will meet with Marc Dillard to hear about current US - Kenya relationship dynamics in the national and regional context. Mr. Dillard will also update the group on the US role in malnutrition and conservation efforts in Kenya. This briefing will provide participants with important background and context about the work of US agencies like US Department of State, USAID, USDA, and the US Fish & Wildlife Service, among others, as well as US partnerships with UN agencies like UNDP, UNEP, and the World Food Programme, which directly relate to participants' work on conservation and food security issues.

17:00 - 17:30 Return to the hotel, clean up for dinner at the hotel

19:00 -21:00 Dinner briefing with local conservation, food security, and human development organizations

ICCF partners and others implementing food security and conservation initiatives will convene to discuss the overlapping issues facing Kenya and East Africa. The delegation will hear about a wide array of conservation and food security projects being implemented on the ground, including projects supported by US and UN agencies, and how the issues overlap, giving participants a better understanding of the scope of projects in the region. Invited participants include: PATH, USAID, UN Environment Programme, World Wildlife Fund, SUN CSN, Wildlife Conservation Society, African Wildlife Foundation, African Parks, BAND Foundation, UNICEF, Kenyan Ministry of Health, and World Food Programme.

- Dr. Mohanjeet Brar will brief the delegation on the role of sustainable tourism in supporting conservation. The delegation will gain a better understanding of the ecotourism models in Kenya and the economic opportunities presented for local communities, which will inform participants' work in Congress on conservation and natural resource issues. Mohanjeet started his career as the Managing Director of Gamewatchers Safaris & Porini Camps in 2005. In 2019, he became a Trustee of the Wildlife Habitat Trust and a Board Member of the Kenya Tourism Board. Mohanjeet also served as a Board Member of the Maasai Mara Wildlife Conservancies Association from 2013 to 2021. In 2021, he co-founded Earthacre and became a Board Member of the African Wildlife Foundation, the Kenya Association of Tour Operators, and the African Conservation Center. Overall, Mohanjeet Brar has held various leadership positions and contributed significantly to the tourism and conservation sectors.*

- 15:30 - 18:30 Field briefing with Senior Warden Simon Nkoitai, a Maasai from the community who leads the Ol Kinyei Conservancy management on the ground
- Simon Nkoitai will brief the delegation on Ol Kinyei's management and operations, as well as its successes and challenges. The discussion will provide participants with the warden's unique perspectives as a community member with respect to his conservancy, which will also inform later discussions with the MMWCA on the broader conservancy model.*
- 18:30 - 19:00 Return to camp
- 19:00 - 21:30 Dinner briefing on critical landscape conservation, including protected areas management and other effective area-based conservation measures (OECMs) like the Maasai Mara conservancies
- ICCF staff will lead a discussion on management challenges of protected areas and OECMs and explore partnership models that make these areas effective. Participants will learn, broadly, how each of these models operates and how they support short- and long-term sustainability throughout the continent. This discussion will inform participants' work on conservation and natural resources by illustrating how different models are successful in their respective contexts.*



Protected areas are widely recognized as the “anchors” to any effort to preserve and regenerate nature and restore ecosystems for the benefit of wildlife, human well-being, and Africa’s economies. Yet, most African countries lack the funding and capacity necessary to effectively manage protected areas.

OECMs are defined as “a geographically defined area other than a Protected Area, which is governed and managed in ways that achieve positive and sustained long-term outcomes for the in situ conservation of biodiversity, with associated ecosystem functions and services and, where applicable, cultural, spiritual, socioeconomic, and other locally relevant values.”

ownership and land-use rights associated with it, and the direct support they have received from the US government. This discussion will further inform participants' work on conservation and natural resources, illustrating how the conservancy model generates sustainable incomes for individual landowners.

The Maasai Mara Wildlife Conservancies Association is a membership organization of the Mara Conservancies established in 2013. They have a mandate from landowners and tourism parties to play an overarching coordination role for Greater Mara Ecosystem stakeholders. Currently, they have a membership of 24 conservancies at different stages of development, covering about 450,000 acres. The member conservancies bring together over 15,000 landowners who annually receive approximately 7.5 Million paid as lease fees.

13:30 - 15:00

Afternoon Break. No activities are planned at this time, and members of the delegation will have an opportunity to rest before evening activities.

15:00 - 18:00

Field briefing and visit to a local boma (Maasai homestead) to see one of the lion-proof enclosures and engage with community members, led by Sammy Ole Mpusia, the community liaison officer.

Sammy Ole Mpusia was instrumental in setting up the Ol Kinyei conservancy 19 years ago and getting community buy-in, which is still an ongoing process. He will brief the delegation about cost-effective solutions, like the lion-proof enclosures, to mitigate human-wildlife conflicts, as well as ways in which conservation benefits humans living in proximity to parks and protected areas. For participants, this discussion will build on the morning's observations to see how the communities are tangibly addressing these challenges. Human-wildlife conflict is a serious obstacle to wildlife conservation worldwide and is becoming more prevalent as human population increases, development expands, and other human and environmental factors put people and wildlife in greater direct competition for a shrinking resource base.

19:30 - 21:30

Dinner briefing on global biodiversity and habitat loss, land use change, and environmental migration

ICCF representatives will lead a discussion on global biodiversity loss and its implications. More than one million species may be in danger of extinction this century, creating grave threats to human health, well-being, food security, regional stability, and continued economic success. Africa is the most vulnerable continent to the impacts of these changes, subject to increasing frequency and severity of natural disasters, unpredictable rainfall, and widespread crop failure. An estimated 36 million people across Africa



are displaced, mostly from conflict. This number has tripled since 2011, representing 44% of the global total.

This discussion will tie together information learned on the trip, more closely examine linkages to broader global issues, and include a discussion of various development mechanisms available to finance global conservation efforts and how these efforts can work in tandem.

The delegation will also learn about the process and training to become a guide or ranger in Kenya and the opportunities these roles create for local employment.

09:00 - 10:30 Breakfast with Dr. John Sankok, CEO of Community Health Partners (CHP)

Dr. Sankok will brief the delegation on CHP's health and community development programs. The delegation will learn how these programs work in tandem with the conservancy model to support human development in the communities. Community Health Partners has been on the forefront of healthcare since 1980, and played an especially big role during the COVID-19 pandemic. They work on two fronts: primary health care services and community development initiatives. Their overall strategic plan is to contribute to the delivery of quality, accessible, and affordable health services.

The Maa Trust is a non-profit organisation working with community-owned conservancies in the Maasai Mara, Kenya. They work to increase the benefits of wildlife and conservation to Maasai families so that they appreciate, and contribute to the protection of, wild animals on their land.

The Maa Trust empowers local people by promoting small business startups & micro finance schemes, enabling them to make their own money



and to invest in their family's development. Their members self-identify their needs and wish list of items, and The Maa Trust helps them to save up for and attain these. Despite a severe lack of education granted to girl children in previous years, their female beadwork and honey members are now affording and investing in clean drinking water for their homes, solar power, alternative fuel to firewood, and they can now send more of their children to school.

Beading with the Maa Trust representatives

Maa Beadwork is a social enterprise established by The Maa Trust as a sustainable alternative livelihood to generate income for Maasai women and their families. Beading is a tribal art and talent of Maasai women, who have been famed for their adornment for centuries. The delegation will have the opportunity to do some beadwork with the local women and purchase items to support their business.

Field briefing with conservancy representatives to introduce the delegation to the Maasai Mara ecosystem

Conservancy representatives will brief the delegation on the Maasai Mara ecosystem en route through the conservancy. This will inform participants on the types and density of fauna and flora found in the conservancies and the larger ecosystem.

The Maasai Mara is Kenya's most important wildlife and tourism area. Roughly 25% of Kenya's wildlife resides within the greater Maasai Mara region, a 4,500 km² wildlife landscape comprised of the 1,510 km² Maasai Mara National Reserve (MMNR) and 3,000 km² of adjacent community and private lands. This area includes the key dry season range for the largest animal migration left on Earth.
